A Message from the ONNY President

Dear ONNY Patrons and Community Members.

Thank you for taking the time to read this preview of The Orchestra of Northern New York's 2024-2025 Annual Report to the community.

This past year has been one marked by success for our organization.

First and foremost, our new Music Director and Conductor, Col. Michael J. Colburn, USMC (Ret.) wowed audiences with thoughtfully programmed and masterfully performed concerts in Potsdam, Watertown, Wellesley Island, and Massena. Consequently, ONNY had ticket revenues higher than our budget projections.

We held our inaugural Cabaret Show with Desserts at SUNY Potsdam with tickets sold out before the event.

Our community-favorite holiday brunch and silent auction also raised funds to support our annual programming.

We saw the return of our Young Artist Competition where the winner, 16-yearold violinist Eric Lee of Manlius, gave a stellar performance with ONNY in our April concerts.

This summer, ONNY musicians returned to the Adirondacks for four concerts in our Summer Chamber Music series.

Finally, through the generosity of our community, individual contributions last year exceeded our targets, resulting in a positive bottom line. I hope you'll agree that it was a banner year for ONNY!

The success of our 37th season last year will have lasting impacts. First, the

ONNY Board of Directors established a reserve fund to help our organization react to unexpected expenses and be more responsive to opportunities to share the power of music with our community.

Second, ONNY has been able to shift its focus to expanding musical offerings. For our 38th Star-Studded Season this year, we have returned to a full orchestra for all concerts, including our winter holiday concert.

I am grateful for our very capable Board of Directors, who recently adopted a three-year strategic plan aimed at returning ONNY to a six-concert season and strengthening our youth programs by our 40th season.

The strategic pillars for our plan are artistic programming, audience devel-

opment and community engagement, and accountability in finances and organization.

This year, our Board's focus is on preparing for growth by:

- 1. Meeting or exceeding our budgeted board fundraising goals,
- 2. Strengthening the Orchestra's financial and operational capacity,
- 3. Initiating preparations for a major fundraising effort to meet our growth targets,
- 4. Supporting efforts to expand regional outreach, and
 - 5. Enhancing marketing and publicity.

As always, I remain incredibly grateful to our community for their support of ONNY. From housing orchestra members to moving equipment and distributing posters and concert programs, our volunteers are instrumental to ONNY's success. Thank you! In return for their service, volunteers receive complimentary tickets to our performances.

Our Musicians: the Heart & Soul of ONNY

ONNY musicians are Crane School of Music faculty members, public school music teachers, and a handful of exceptionally talented students from Crane.

Others are a medical doctor, an internship coordinator, a translator for museum and art book publishers, orchestra teachers, a former US Marine Band musician, a training and development coordinator, a retired Montreal Symphony musician, a lecturer, curriculum coordinator and teacher of 3D graphics for video games, a composer, a content creator, and even a world-class fiddler.

In 2024-2025, 117 gifted musicians were engaged in one or more of ONNY's programs. About 80% live in the North Country or Adirondacks, while roughly

20% travel in when special positions cannot be filled locally.

Together, these remarkable individuals form the heart and soul of ONNY.

Their artistry, dedication, and diversity of backgrounds enrich our community, and we are deeply grateful for every one of them.

ONNY Concertmaster: an Accomplished Crossover Artist



Liesl Schoenberger Doty began her tenure as Concertmaster of the Orchestra of Northern New York in July 2025.

A renowned artist, recitalist, and chamber musician, she is equally celebrated as a soloist, having performed with numerous orchestras across the United States and at many distinguished festivals and concert series.

In addition to her classical career, Liesl is an accomplished crossover artist.

She has released three commercial fiddle albums in collaboration with

musical legends Buddy Spicher and David Grier.

In 2012, she joined Boston's Grammy-nominated chamber orchestra A Far Cry, where she met bassist Karl Doty—now her husband and musical partner in their crossover duo, The Dotys.

She currently serves as Associate Professor of Violin at the Crane School of Music, with previous faculty appointments at Dartmouth College, the University of New Hampshire, Yale and other institutions.

My Musical Journey Includes Excellence, Mentorship & Community

As a charter member of ONNY, I was honored to be among the first students invited to perform alongside seasoned professionals.

That opportunity was both exhilarating and formative, offering me a level of musical challenge and artistic collaboration that far exceeded my college orchestra experience.

The repertoire was consistently demanding, pushing me to grow as a musician and deepening my love for orchestral performance.

From the very beginning, ONNY stood out as a place where excellence, mentorship, and community converged, and



I knew I had found something truly special.

What has kept me with ONNY for 37 years is the enduring spirit of the organization. While the orchestra has grown from a small chamber group into a full-size symphony, its core mission has remained unchanged: to bring live, professional music to audiences across the North Country and to inspire young musicians.

I have always been passionate about ONNY's youth initiatives, especially the annual Concerto Competition, which gives high school students the chance to perform with us—an experience that mirrors my own early excitement. Seeing

their joy and pride on stage is a powerful reminder of why I continue to play.

ONNY's consistent leadership, first under Ken Andrews and now with Michael Colburn, has ensured that our artistic standards remain high while embracing new musical horizons. It is this blend of tradition, innovation, and heart that has made ONNY my musical home for nearly four decades.

Christine Prevost, Central Square, NY, first joined the Orchestra of Northern New York — then known as the Chamber Orchestra of Northern NY (CONNY) — as a student in 1988 while studying cello at the Crane School of Music.

She has performed with many groups including ONNY, Northern Choral Society, Northern Lights Orchestra, Syracuse Chorale, and Trillium String Trio.

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A Message from Our Music Director

Greetings,

I'm pleased to report that we've got another exciting season of music lined up for the Orchestra of Northern New York!

As was the case last season, all our programs will feature classic orchestral works, music of stage and screen, and works influenced by popular culture.

We promise that you'll leave every concert humming the beautiful melodies you've heard the magnificent musicians of ONNY present!

Our October concert, entitled "Star-Crossed," was a reference to William Shakespeare's phrase to describe the ill-fated couple at the heart of his play Romeo and Juliet.

The play is directly responsible for two works on the program: Tchaikovsky's Overture-Fantasy Romeo and Juliet and Leonard Bernstein's modern reimagining of the classic tale, West Side Story.

The concert began with music from Bizet's classic opera Carmen, which is celebrating its 150th anniversary this year! The affairs at the center of Carmen represent a different type of star-crossed love, but one every bit as destined for a tragic fate. This timeless music also reflects the beauty, joy, passion, and happiness that are essential to these timeless tales!

Although we are grateful to our fabulous brass and percussion musicians for presenting our holiday concerts for the last two seasons, I'm excited to report that we will once again utilize our entire orchestra for this year's program, entitled "Home for the Holidays."



The concert will include classical favorites from composers like Tchaikovsky, Bizet, and Rimsky-Korsakov, pop and jazz favorites from Irving Berlin, Leroy Anderson, and Mel Tormé, and works from beloved holiday film scores like Miracle on 34th Street, The Polar Express, and Home Alone. I'm especially excited to feature Alfred Reed's magnificent Russian Christmas Music, a work that is a standard for the concert band, but is rarely heard in an orchestral setting.

Our April program begins a year-long celebration of the 250th anniversary of the founding of our country. We've entitled the program "Summon the Heroes," and will

begin the concert with a stirring work of the same title composed by the incomparable American composer John Williams.

The central work of the event is Aaron Copland's monumental Lincoln Portrait, a work that features not only Copland's inspiring music, but also the words of our 16th President. Our narrator for the performance will be North Country legend Guy C. "Chip" Lamson. The final work on the concert is Howard Hanson's gorgeous and powerful Symphony No.2, better known by its subtitle "Romantic."

As usual, the season wraps up with our annual Summer Pops program, but this year there's a twist! Joining us as co-presenters is the Frederic Remington Museum in Ogdensburg. One of our nation's most accomplished artists, Remington was not only born in the North Country, but he lived for many years in Canton, Ogdensburg, and the Thousand Islands.

The program will view the history of our nation through Remington's unique lens, and will include the music of composers like John Philip Sousa, Aaron Copland, George Gershwin, Charles Ives, Morton Gould, Scott Joplin, and others.

I couldn't be more excited about our upcoming season, and as always, hope that you'll stop in the lobby after the concert to say hello and let me know what you thought of the concert.

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

Crane Student Apprentices

Each year, a select group of outstanding students from the Crane School of Music are invited to perform alongside ONNY's seasoned professionals in one or more concerts.

These apprenticeships set a high bar of excellence while offering an unparalleled opportunity to experience life as part of a professional symphony orchestra.

Since 2019, The Secret Sits Pro Musica Ensembles, Inc. (TSS) of Athens, GA, and Gull Pond, NY, has generously underwritten the apprentices' stipends. ONNY is deeply grateful for their continued support.

Young Artist Competition

High school students who embrace the motto "Striving for Excellence" compete each year for the chance to perform as a soloist with ONNY and earn a \$500 first prize.

In 2025, 16-year-old violinist Eric Lee impressed audiences in Potsdam and Watertown with a dazzling performance — played entirely from memory — of the first movement of Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto in E Minor.

Now a senior at Christian Brothers Academy in Syracuse, Eric is the son of Kelly and Young Lee of Manlius.

Second- and third-place prizes of \$350 and \$150 are also awarded. The next competition will take place on Saturday, January 24, 2026, with applications due January 9, 2026.


In April, we had the pleasure of celebrating these incredible individuals at a special reception at Sergi's Banquet Hall in Potsdam.

Board Establishes Reserve Fund

Thanks to the generosity of donors in 2024-2025, the ONNY Board of Directors has established a new \$23,000 reserve fund.

This dedicated savings account will provide support in the event of unexpected financial emergencies and unique, mission-aligned opportunities -- once all other reasonable funding sources have been considered.

The Board intends to build and maintain a reserve equal to six months of regular operating expenses.

Growth of the fund will come from year-end surpluses of unrestricted funds as well as one-time donations, gifts and grants specifically designated for reserve puposes.

Planned Giving


